A Message from RTNA President Chris Little

Welcome to the biggest night of the year for the RTNA!

The Golden Mikes are the best-known thing that we do, and perhaps that's how you know the organization. But, we are working for you year-round to address issues we face as broadcast journalists.

In 2022, we coordinated nearly 50 camera pools for coverage of everything from court trials to memorial services for fallen public safety officers. By sharing resources, these pools save stations tens of thousands of dollars every year.

Our pools also covered a number of special events, like inaugural events for L.A.'s new mayor and Los Angeles County's new Sheriff, and the largest pool in recent years, the victory parade for the 2022 Rams Super Bowl Champions.

We are working with the Los Angeles International Airport to ensure, as the airport undergoes a major remodel, that broadcast crews will be able to access key areas for coverage of events.

We have investigated incidents where broadcast journalists have been prevented from doing their jobs by law enforcement officers. We work with officials at various agencies to ensure we have the legal access we need to do our jobs. And, as a part of that effort, we do training sessions with law enforcement personnel so they understand our rights as journalists.

The RTNA also continues to support the broadcast journalists of tomorrow. Over the last four decades, we have given out more than 100 scholarships. Many of those scholarship winners are now working broadcast professionals.

And, of course, there's the reason we are here tonight, which is to salute the best in local broadcast journalism and honor some of our own. Congratulations to RTNA Lifetime Achievement Award Winners Marc Brown from KABC, Vikki Vargas from KNBC and Hal Eisner from KTTV.

We hope that you will consider joining the RTNA. As a non-profit, we need your support and, remember, we are here to serve you.

Congratulations to all of our nominees, honorees and winners, and I hope you enjoy the evening!

Vikki Vargas

Vikki Vargas, the long-time reporter and NBC4 Orange County bureau chief, has enjoyed 40 years of telling stories about the community where she grew up, went to school and raised her daughter.

After four decades of what she calls an "unconventional career," Vargas put down the NBC4 microphone in December 2022.

For Vargas, journalism has always been about people. "The biggest benefit to me has been the number of you who allowed me to come into your homes, into your hearts and your lives," she said in a video posted to Facebook. "When I knock on that door and the person on the other side says, 'Yes,' it's phenomenal to me, it's the biggest perk of this job."

Vargas has seen the industry evolve over the years. "Our newsroom is so diverse and so different than when I started,"



she said. "That is something that we should all be proud of." That became possible because of trailblazers like Vargas. "I saw somebody on TV who had a last name like me, and I saw somebody on TV who looked like me, and that was so powerful," NBC4 Executive Producer Stephanie Miranda said. "What an honor that is for me to say, not only am I working with Vikki Vargas, but we're working as a team. That was also the kind of moment that I just tuck under my pillow at night."

Throughout her impressive career at NBC4, Vargas covered national and international stories, from the Republican National Convention to the release of the American hostages in Iran. Some of her most notable local stories include being the first to release the video of three inmates who escaped from an Orange County maximum-security jail, the Seal Beach hair salon massacre and the federal indictment of Orange County's former Sheriff, Mike Carona.

Vargas partnered with NBC4 to endow and create the NBC4-Vikki Vargas Scholarship at her alma mater, California State University, Fullerton, which has been awarded to a journalism student annually since 2012.

While Vargas has a reputation for being a great friend, writer, community leader and breaking news reporter, she has her challenges. "She won't admit it, but she's a terrible cook," her daughter Chandler Nason said. "Vikki does not cook," her husband, Michael Nason, added. "Vikki's idea of dinner would be hors d'oeuvres." They have been husband and wife for 36 years. Vargas is always quick to say how much her husband and daughter sacrificed because of the unpredictable and demanding nature of news.

"Vikki truly believed that if you treat the community with respect, they will trust you, and they trusted Vikki," said Todd Mokhtari, President and General Manager of NBC4 and Telemundo 52. "She did it year after year for 40 years. Amazing."

Honoring the Firefighter Pilots of Southern California



The Board of Directors of the Radio & Television News Association of Southern California is honored to recognize the air operations units of five major fire agencies in Southern California.

During the 73rd Annual Golden Mike Awards®, pilots from the Los Angeles County Fire Department, Ventura County Fire Department, Orange County Fire Authority, Los Angeles City Fire and Coulson Aviation will be recognized for their skill and bravery.

Firefighter pilots in Southern California have long been the gold standard for aerial firefighting and were the first in the world to implement night flights for fire suppression. Pilots from these agencies have trained other pilots around the world on best practices and the latest advancements in aerial fire suppression. Aerial firefighting has also provided some of the most dramatic and compelling news footage used by outlets around the globe.

In the last few years Coulson Aviation has become a regular fixture in Southern California with the arrival of the Chinook CH-47 double rotor VLAT (Very Large Air Tanker), capable of carrying 3,000 gallons of water and retardant. The Chinook is part of the QRF (Quick Reaction Force) created by Orange County Fire Authority Chief Brian Fennessy in partnership with Southern California Edison. The QRF is comprised of the Los Angeles County Fire Department, the Orange County Fire Authority, the Ventura County Fire Department and Coulson Aviation.

The Board of the RTNA wishes to congratulate the firefighting pilots of Southern California. The segment during the Golden Mike Awards® is cosponsored by Coulson Aviation and SoCal Edison.




Marc has won six Emmys, a Golden Mike, an Associated Press award and a Radio and Television News Directors Association award for excellence in TV news reporting.

Hal Eisner is in his 41st year on television in Los Angeles.

Most of those years have been spent on FOX 11 News and KCOP13.

Eisner is currently a reporter on KTTV 11, hosts FOX 11 News "In Depth" and the FOX 11 podcast "What the Hal?"

Hal has received numerous journalism awards over the years including Emmys, Golden Mikes, honors from the L.A.

Press Club, the Society of Professional Journalists (SPJ) and the Associated Press. Among his AP honors, he received a Lifetime Achievement Award known as the Stan Chambers Award for Extraordinary Achievement.

Hal created the nationally recognized mentoring program Camp News, which was previously known as APTRA Academy. Each year it draws aspiring reporters and anchors from all over the country and has been a labor of love for the past two decades.

Hal started reporting news on the radio in his home state of Texas. It was when he became a correspondent for CNN in the early '80s that he came to Los Angeles and turned his attention to television.

Eisner is on the National Board of SAG-AFTRA and has been active in the union for many years. He was also on the Board of Governors of the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences and served as a Vice Chair of ATAS. He was President of Associated Press Television Radio Association (APTRA) and continues to be very active in the industry.

The Vin Scully Scholarship for Broadcasting

The Radio & Television News Association of Southern California is proud to announce the creation of the Vin Scully Scholarship for Broadcasting.

On August 22, 2022, the sports world and the broadcast community lost a great one-of-a-kind talent. Vin Scully began calling games for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1950. When the team moved to Los Angeles, so did Scully. He was the voice of the Dodgers for 67 seasons and quickly became an icon in broadcasting, having also called football games, basketball games and golf tournaments.

Scully left an indelible mark in sportscasting. To honor his memory and contributions to the broadcast industry, the RTNA created the Vin Scully Scholarship for Sportscasting. This is the only scholarship endorsed by the family of Vin Scully. In fact, when the board of the RTNA approached the family they replied, "This is so moving and so special for Dad's legacy."

The scholarship is open to any student enrolled in an accredited college or university who is not scheduled to graduate by December of the application school year. The student is required to have an emphasis in sportscasting via television, radio or digital video/audio.

Students who speak Spanish, are bilingual or come from underserved communities are encouraged to apply. Applicants will be required to complete the application along with a demo reel.

The scholarship jury will be comprised of professional broadcasters/ sportscasters, RTNA Board Members and a representative of the Vin Scully family.

The scholarship recipients will be honored at the annual Golden Mike Awards® ceremony.

AIR SUPPORT FIREFIGHTERS PLAY A CRITICAL ROLE

Reporting on Fires from the Air

Fires are terrifying to report on. From the air they become surreal. You are out of harm's way, high above in a helicopter or airplane trying to convey to the listener that they just might be in harm's way! Reporting on fires is extremely dynamic. Something is always moving beneath you: flames, smoke, wind, people, animals and first responders. If the fire starts out as a brush fire and then continues to destroy homes and life, the event becomes extraordinary. It touches those directly involved and in a different way those simply observing the tragedy. When a home is destroyed by fire, it's more than wood, plaster and building materials. You're watching someone's life just disappearing before your eyes. A note from your dad, a picture of Grandma, a memento of your life... countless objects that you could always turn to... now gone.

Be it a fire just starting to spread, a police matter that could affect others or simply a traffic report that will impact your drive, air support is a must!

This year at our 73rd Golden Mike Awards® Ceremony, it is with great pride that we honor the Air Support Divisions of the Fire Departments of our surrounding Counties.

In the early '90s, Fire Department Air Support in and around Los Angeles consisted of just a few light-to-medium helicopters. The pilots and crews with the Los Angeles Fire Department Air Support were just starting to learn the complexities and dangers that came with night operations. The invaluable benefits from airborne water and retardant drops from helicopters and fixed-

wing aircraft were the top subject of almost every after-action report.

Having covered so many different types of fires over the last 20+ years in Los Angeles and surrounding counties, a few really stand out. They make you grateful for the bed you climb into at night and that picture of Mom standing next to the airplane she soloed in many years ago! A fire that hit a section of Malibu, California, one windy night is one that is always with me. As usual in this part of Los Angeles County, when the Santa Ana winds start to blow, sometimes with gusts to over 50 mph, they enter the San Fernando Valley in the northeast corner near Sylmar and the Newhall Pass, travel southwest across the west San Fernando Valley and finally out to the Pacific Ocean and Malibu. Along the way, they get squeezed through passes and canyons, up slopes and down slopes, getting super-charged by the topography along the way. The flames feed on usually dry brush. By the time the wind-driven fire hits the Santa Monica Mountains, the news station term "out-of-control wild fire" is an understatement!

This night, what started out as what should have been a rather innocent vehicle fire alongside Pacific Coast Highway near The Bluffs Park went from a routine call to the Fire Department to destroying several

homes and damaging several more in just an hour or so. Luckily for the rest of Malibu and the people that live there, the fire went down slope towards Malibu road, over it in a flash and onto the small strip of beach front homes and finally into the Pacific Ocean. The fire received a lot of media coverage including some national coverage due mostly to its incredible speed and the fame of a few of the homeowners directly involved.

The other side of that experience was the largest brush fire in Los Angeles County fire history – the Station Fire.

There has been and still is a vicious cycle of weather in Los Angeles. It is warm and dry most of the year, but during what is the fall for most of the country, strange things begin to happen in Southern California. First, the wind starts to blow, followed by the wind blowing hard, followed by the dreaded Santa Ana winds. Generally speaking, the howling winds comes from the Northeast to the Southwest. They have been described in fiction and fact, but trust me, they just make the av-

erage person feel weird and a tad on edge. So, first it's wind followed by great fires, some reaching historic numbers, then later or near the top of the New Year comes the rain. The rain never seems to come in nice, sensible showers, but arrives in great intense storms that overpower the areas that really need the water and have yet to figure out how to save it or store it. Most of it winds up in Long Beach harbor.

There's a kind of ennui in the early stages of a fire. We've been there so many times before that we assume we know what will happen next in those early stages. By day two, however, I was confronted with the unthinkable – a massive out-of-control wildfire starting to ramp up big-time. Late in the afternoon on that August day in 2009, I spotted smoke up in the Angeles National Forest as we were taking off for the afternoon shift. Our newsroom was getting some calls from people who could see the smoke as well. Indications were that brush was burning alongside Angeles Crest Highway above La Canada Flintridge. As it turned out, the origin was close to a Ranger Station in the mountains. That point of origin gave it the name – the Station Fire.

As we flew above it, I reported on what I could see. It was quite active. There was a lot of flame, smoke and fuel (dry brush), but the all-important wind was nowhere near a Santa Ana condition. Windy, yes, but manageable. I thought the responding fire attack would be able to get a handle on it before nightfall. The "handle on it" didn't come for the better part of a month after burning 251 square miles (160,000 acres), 89 homes and 209 other structures, and killing two firefighters as they tried to retreat from advancing flames by driving off a narrow mountain road covered in smoke and

A Grumman S-2T Turbo Tracker tanker in Cal Fire colors. (Source: CAL FIRE) flame. Roads were closed for more than a year, and a long investigation would follow and include all the fire jurisdictions involved.

The fire was extremely tough for the media to cover, describe and photograph due to the fact that the Station Fire for the most part was a fuel-driven fire rather than one pushed and directed by high winds. The incredible amount of smoke just rose directly over the fire, obscuring what was burning.

In the end, the Station Fire was the 10th largest wildfire in modern Los Angeles history. The next year, parts of La Canada Flintridge, Tujunga and Glendale were inundated with mudslides pouring off the now-naked hillside where trees and brush had once held it all together. In Los Angeles, one must be extremely careful where one builds and lives. A mudslide is an almost silent monster that slowly gathers everything in its path downhill until it arrives at the rear of your home and then proceeds to go right through it, taking lives and home along with it.

There was one cul-de-sac in Altadena hit by the firestorm. As soon as it broke, we flew over the zone. I looked down and saw 15 homes burned down to their slab foundations. But one home was intact and the owner was standing outside with a small child. As we went over, he looked up at us, put out his arms and shrugged like he couldn't believe it himself.

Every moment we were seeing people of great courage. In every fire, people who had been asked to evacuate their homes just chose to stay with their property and remained up there with their hoses and buckets of

That's someone taking a stand and saying, "Wait a minute, this is mine and I want to protect it, and I'm going to keep it." That, to me, is amazing. Unfortunately, if the situation gets bad, such fast decisions can put the first responders at great risk if they have to go back in and rescue those who refused to evacuate.


I was also impressed and confused by the relentless nature of the fire. I remember a moment during the Station Fire when the flames climbed back into the San Gabriel Mountains and marched right up to them while the wind was blowing down the mountains in complete contradiction.

Lessons learned from every single firefight have brought fast, pro-active change to the world that firefighting pilots and crews must live in. Nighttime operations in any type of aviation will bring its own set of issues to be aware of and deal with. Fighting a fast-moving fire at night with helicopters and fixedwing aircraft in bad weather, around obstacles, in dense smoke, flames and other close-by aircraft is a world only few can bear witness to! Advances in nightvision-equipped aircraft and pilots have moved air ops into a level of extraordinary involvement. To all the pilots, crews, air support divisions and outside companies devoted to airborne firefighting equipment, we thank you!
